

CRAOBH CAIÓE NA MUMHAN 1917



Ní haon ionadh nach raibh an Ríocht ann ach bhí láimh ag Ciarráí i mbua an Chláir. Tar éis don Ríocht an ceann ab fhéarr a fháil ar na Tiobradaigh i 1916 tharraifidár siar as an gcomórtas. Bhí cúis mhaith acu. Bhí an chuid ba mhó de na himreoirí caide ab fhéarr sá chontae mar chinn i bhFrongoch agus ina measc luanín tear mór na caide, Dick Fitzgerald.

D'imirg Tomás Ághas (1885-1917) ar shuí na firinne ar 25 Meán Fómhair 1917. Iarchaptaen Lios Póil ab ea é is ball de bhord an chontae ab ea é. Bhí an Ríocht as rocht ar fad ó thaobh na caide de bharr Éirí Amach na Cásca ach:

'While many assumed this decision was due to the number of Kerry players languishing in internment, the Kerry GAA instead explained that they were in dire financial straits and simply could not afford the cost of the team's continued involvement in national competitions.' Richard McElligott

An Clár v Corcaigh (1917)

Bhuaigh An Clár ar Phort Láirge is ar Thiobraid Árann is bhuaigh Corcaigh ar Luimneach. Ní raibh Ciarráí san iomáfocht i 1917 ach oiread, dar ndóin. Bhí an lá leis an gClár, ambaist. Dhein foireann an Chláir slad ar na Corcaigh:

'After an evenly contested first half the Banner took control of the exchanges to win by 5-4 to 0-1.' 15/10/17 Munster G.A.A. Story (1986) J. Cronin

B'É Willie Walsh (Port Láirge) an réiteoir. Bhí rath nach beag ar foireann an Chláir i 1917. D'imirfodar 5 chluiche is níor éirigh le haon dream báide a fháil ina gcoinnibh.

Thug Corcaigh (Lees) Craobh na hÉireann leo i 1911. I leabhar Bob Honohan, **Rebels With A Cause – 120 Years of Cork Football**, deir sé;

'Sadly, for whatever reason, there was a sharp decline in their fortunes following the All Ireland victory of 1911....'

Níor aimsigh Corcaigh ach cíulín amháin i 1912, 1913, 1914 is 1917.


Cluiche Ceannais Peile na Mumhan 1917

Ní raibh ach Mícheál Ó Maothagáin nó Mick Mehigan de chuid foireann 1911 ar foireann Chorcaí i 1917. Bhí Mehigan ina chaptain mó le rá ar an bhfoireann sin. Bhí clú nach beag ar a dheartháir, Patrick Denis Mehigan (1884–1965) Carbery mar iriseoir spóirt. Ilbhfeárainn i

bparóiste Ard Ó bhFicheallaigh a rugadh is a tógadh iad. Ag caint i dtaoibh a n-athar (Denis) deir Carbery : "On a harvest day he would climb to our bedroom, at about eight by the sun and shout at us in Irish: 'Brostaigh! Brostaigh, a bhuaachaill! Tá an lá ag rith orainn'. (Breathnach / Ní Mhurchú)

D'imir Mícheál le Clanna Caolite nuair a bhí sé óg is le Lees nuair a bhog sé chun na cathrach. Dlíthchára leis an gCoileánach ab ea é is bhí saol deacair aige ina dhiaidh sin go háirithe nuair a bhí sé in Wormwood Scrubs.

Ní raibh ach 7 d'foireann 1916 ar foireann Chorcaí.

'...it seemed to deliver a shattering blow to football morale in the county and it was not until a decade later that Cork were again kingpins in Munster.' Honohan (ICh. 63).

Tháinig deireadh le dhá chlub mhóra, áfach, agus cé gur bunaíodh Lees arfstá tá deireadh ar fad leo anois.

'The city's best football clubs in the early years of the GAA were Nils (Nil Desperandum - Despair of Nothing) and Lees, both largely made up of West Cork men working in town.' IT Seán Moran 1997 3 Bealtaine

Baile Uí Bheacháin

Bhí tigh tábhairne cáiliúil i bhFánóir ag Paddy O'Donoghue (Baile Uí Bheacháin)

'Anthony O'Donoghue built the pub on his return from Boston in the early 20th century.. Then in the early 1930s, Paddy O'Donoghue, Anthony's nephew, a tradesman and county footballer, took over. Paddy played centre-field for the Clare team in 1917 but missed out on an All-Ireland title, beaten by the Wexford team that won four in-a-row.'

Doir a mhac Brendan:



"When I was going to school, a lot of the stories here or the tales were in Irish. So I picked up quite a bit of Irish and I understand or understood quite a few of the older people. Many of the old people spoke nothing only Irish."

Tull (Turlough Owen) Considine (An Clár) 1898-1980

Saolaíodh Tull; duine de laochra móra an Chláir in Inis in 1898. D'imir sé caid is iomáint leis na Dalcassians. Ceannródaí ab ea é ina chur chuige chun traenála. Bhí cáil nach beag ar Tull is a chuid deartháireacha is bhí borradh faoin gcaid is faoin iomáint, leis, sa chontae ag an am.

Léiríonn Dr W. Murphy an dlíthcheangal idir an CLG agus Sinn Féin ar an ngort caide i gCo. an Chláir:

'The Clare County Board began the process that saw de Valera nominated to contest the by-election of July 1917 and during its march to the All-Ireland football final of that year the Clare team entered the field, round after round, under the banner 'Up de Valera'.'

Dick Fitzgerald (1882-1930)

Bhí dlíthcheangal ag Dick féin le Corcaigh is leis an gClár dála an scéil. D'imir sé caid dá scoil cois Laoi is bhí sé ag maireachtaint i gCorcaigh, leis, ar feadh tamaill. Laoch caide is duine an-mhór le rá ab ea é go deimhín fhéin. Bhí Sham Spellissay (Inis) mar thráenálaí ag an gClár, agus bhí Dick mar chóitseálaí acu de réir dealraimh.

Deir D. Hassan:

'Fitzgerald was fulfilling a range of functions at this time because ... he took control of a Clare team devoid of any tradition in football, consistently one of the poorest sides in the Munster championship back then, and guided them to an All-Ireland final. It was a remarkable coaching achievement.'

Cluiche Ceannais Peile na hÉireann 1917

Bhain An Clár Cluiche Ceannais na hÉireann amach, leis, ach fuair foireann láidir nótála Loch Garman an ceann ab fhéarr orthu. Bhí taithí thar na beartaibh ag Loch Garman fén dtráth sin.

'Dual star Turlough "Tull" Considine was through on goal for Clare but was tripped up, while both teams had goals disallowed, so only points decided the game, Wexford winning nine to five.'
